


Hillside Promoting Local Restaurants Hit Hard by the Pandemic

The Democratic and Republican Primary Election Will Be Held June 28th

May 31, 2022 - last day to register to vote in person at the Village Hall June 12, 2022 – last day to register to vote online

Residents can register to vote online or by coming to the Hillside Village Hall.

- > You must be a United States Citizen.
- > You must be 18 on or before the date of the next election, which is June 28, 2022.
- > You must live in your election precinct at least 30 days prior to Election Day.
- > You must not be serving a sentence of confinement in any penal institution as a result of a conviction.
- Not registered to vote anywhere else.

To register, please bring two forms of identification, i.e. driver's license, utility bill, etc. One must show your current address. New residents with a current voter registration card may transfer their registration by mail or re-register at the Hillside Village Hall. Remove Your Accumulated Junk and Trash During Hillside's



Annual Spring Cleanup Week.... May 16th through the 20th

Time to do "SPRING CLEANING" and clean out that crawl space, basement, garage, and attic. Residents are encouraged to remove unwanted trash, furniture, appliances, etc. that have accumulated over the years. Please place these items out on your REGULAR TRASH COLLECTION DAY OF CLEANUP WEEK. This opportunity comes only once a year.

Acceptable items... Appliances: (stoves, refrigerators, etc.), Bulk Items: (bicycles, toys, etc.), Carpets: (must be in rolls no more than 5 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter), Fixtures: (toilets, sinks, etc.), Furniture, Paint: (must be hardened in cans with lids OFF), Landscaping Timbers: (must be no longer than 3 feet in length).

Non-Acceptable items... Car Batteries, Explosives, Tires, any type of Fluid (gas, oil, etc.), Ammunition, Radioactive Material, Riding Lawnmowers/Snow Blowers, Hazardous or Medical Waste, Large Automobile Parts, Boats, Snowmobiles, Bricks, Concrete Blocks, Cement or Asphalt Pavement Material, Construction and Demolition Debris.

Disposal of Televisions... The Village of Hillside and Waste Management will **NOT** pick up TV's. For residents only, we have a recycling bin in our lobby where you can properly dispose of certain electronics, including TV's under 30 inches.

50/50 HILLSIDE Sidewalk Program

The Village offers the Public Sidewalk Program to all residents who want to replace damaged public sidewalk squares under the 50/50 Program. If this is something you are interested in, please call Public Works at 708–202–3434 to schedule an appointment to assess your sidewalk's condition. You will then be given a contract for the recommended replacement of squares and the cost to you as the applicant.

Please sign the contract and return it to the Village Hall with payment, which will be required prior to scheduling with our contractor. This work takes place two (2) times per year, typically late spring to early summer and late summer to fall. Feel free to call. 708–202–3434 with any questions you may have.

Street Sweeping Resumes

Hillside street sweeping resumes in March. Anticipated sweep dates for March and April will be March 7th-March 11th, March 21st-March 25th, April 4th-April 8th, and April 18th-April 22nd. Please refrain from parking your car on the street during this time so we can effectively clean our streets.

Yard Waste Pickup Resumes

Waste Management will resume Yard Waste Pickup the week of April 4th. Yard waste (leaves, plant debris, grass clippings, twigs, or small branches, etc.) must be placed in your green yard waste cart or a brown yard waste bag. Place carts on the parkway or driveway apron, by the curb, the evening before your scheduled pickup day.

Sump Pump Discharge

All residents must follow proper discharge of their storm water sump pump. Water must be directed so the grass areas existing in their front or back yard may readily absorb the runoff without creating a flooding/icing condition to adjacent properties or public ways. Improper discharge will create a public nuisance as said in Section 21.305 (Nuisance) of the Municipal Code of Ordinances.

Residential Permits

When contemplating a home project, call the Building/Inspection Services to inquire about the permitting process. This is the homeowner's responsibility and contractors must obtain insurance and licensing to perform the work. Permit applications can be applied for electronically on our website @ www.hillside-il.org, which is preferred, or fill out at our Village Hall.

Branch Pickup Resumes

Hillside branch pick-up will begin the **week of March 7th** and be picked up **once a month** by the Village of Hillside. **Place your branches on the parkway the Sunday before pick-up week begins.** Our Public Works Dept. documents each street with the time and date it was completed and will not return once they have completed a street. The scheduled dates for pick-up are below.

GUIDELINES FOR BRANCH PICKUP

- Place branches on parkway the Sunday before pick-up week begins.
- Entire trees will not be removed. Plan with a hauling service to remove debris when cutting down a tree.
- Branch piles not to exceed 8' long by 5' high by 5' wide.
- Logs 5' or more in diameter must be cut into lengths of 2' or less, stacked and will be picked up separately.
- Bush roots must be removed and will be picked up separately.
- DO NOT mix yard waste with branches.

In addition to above dates, Waste Management includes branch pickup on your garbage day every week April through November. Piles must be sized approx. 2' long x 2' wide x 2' high and bundled with twine for easy pickup.

Flood Safety

- Do not drive through a flooded area or drive around barriers.
- Do not walk-through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive. Six inches of water can knock you off your feet.

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- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. If your house is about to be flooded, turn off the power at the service box. Electrical current can travel through water. Electrocution is the second leading cause of death during floods.
- Be alert to gas leaks. If you smell gas, report it to your gas company. Do not use candles, lanterns, or open flames if you smell gas or are unsure if your gas has been shut off.
- Keep children away from flood waters, ditches, culverts, and storm drains.
- Clean everything that has been wet. Flood water is contaminated with sewage and other chemicals, which pose severe health threats.
- Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors during power outages. Carbon monoxide exhaust can pose serious health hazards.

A Message from Village Trustee John Kramer... Air Force Veteran & Broadview-Hillside American Legion Member

Our recent cold and snow reminded me of an unforgettable winter night I experienced while in the service in Korea.

It was January 1969, and I was stationed at Osan AB in Korea. My job was to schedule air missions over South Korea. I had just finished a 12-hour shift and was headed to supper and then to my barracks to sleep. It was bitterly cold that night, and about five inches of snow fell that day. I had a military parka on which usually kept me warm, but something about that night made it seem so much colder. Anyway, I had eaten at the Club and was heading up an icy hill to my barracks. I was no more than 50 feet or so from the barracks when the Base Siren went off. Suddenly, all the barracks emptied out – everyone was headed to the battle stations they were trained to go to when the sirens sounded. My job was to return to the Command Center in the Headquarters Building.

It took me about 10 minutes to get back to the Command Center. Almost every person on the Base was at his or her set up the strike missions, one to initiate close air support, one for refueling, one for air defense missions, and one to coordinate the mission with other branches of the military.

The emergency alert plan had the initial actions and missions well prepared. The only variant might be where the emergency was in Korea. My specific job that night was to set up the ongoing



Air Defense Aircraft Missions. These aircraft had the job to protect all the other aircraft from air attacks by enemy aircraft (like North Korean MIGs) while they were performing their various missions. I needed to ensure that we always had enough air defense aircraft out there. The five of us had a lot of coordinating to do among ourselves, along with flying units all over Korea and the sea. We set up over 200 missions that night.

assigned spot within 20 minutes or less. As I entered the building, I saw some smoke near the Base Runway and I could hear several aircraft warming up, getting ready to take off or to stand alert. I had no idea what was going on – was it a practice alert or the real thing?

We were told that an aircraft had exploded. While the Commanding Officer said he thought it might be sabotage, we still weren't sure –



It turned out that the explosion was sabotage and that people were two killed. The good news was that it was not a North Korean attack. We were told that it was a small group of anti-government activists who wanted to create more trouble between the North and South Koreans. We were informed that the activists were captured by the South Korean Army.

The F4 Phantom Fighter Jet similar to the one deployed in this air alert

so we had to assume the worst and the alert was sounded. The emergency alert plans called for certain and immediate actions to happen. Some planes would take off and fly to other bases or patrol strategic areas in Korea; some would remain on base in heavily secured areas. Areas like Intelligence, Ordnance, Fuel, Motor Pool, Security, Hospital, even the radar sites all over Korea were all on alert and doing whatever the emergency plans called for. All the Military bases in Korea also were on alert that night.

We had five officers assigned to schedule aircraft missions. We each had different types of missions to schedule; one to This incident affected thousands of American and Korean military personnel. As I said, we had emergency plans for these types of situations. We all worked the plan with every person doing his or her job. It was an incredibly coordinated effort. In the end, it turned out to be a rather minor incident.

It's probably a good thing we rarely hear about these lesser incidents that are just handled. I am thankful to all the military people for what they do, and to our first responders who keep us safe. I also want to thank all of you who have told me how much they enjoyed my articles.

2021 Real Estate Tax Exemptions Available in Early March

If you have already received the following exemptions, you don't need to reapply for the 2021 year:

- -Senior Freeze Exemption
- -Veterans with Disabilities Exemption
- -Persons with Disabilities Exemption
- -Homeowner Exemption
- -Senior Exemption
- -Returning Veterans Exemption

If you need to file for one of the above exemptions, please visit *www.cookcountyassessor.com/exemptions*

The Assessor's Office administers property tax exemptions that may contribute to lowering your property tax bill. These exemptions reduce the equalized assessed value (EAV) or taxed value of a home. As a reminder, exemption deductions appear on the second installment property tax bill issued in the summer.

A homeowner can see which exemptions were applied to their home last year by visiting: *www.cookcountypropertyinfo.com*.

If an exemption you were entitled to in a prior tax year was not applied to a second installment property tax bill in the past, you may be able to apply for a refund through the Certificate of Error process. For more information visit *www.cookcountyassessor.com/ certificates-error*.





Pet owners, don't forget to register your pets. The Village of Hillside has free registration for your dogs and cats. We recommend that you register your pet at the beginning of the year in order to receive your free pet tags. We only ask that you bring in an up-todate rabies vaccination report. In case your pet ever gets lost, the village tag on your pet's collar will help our police department reunite them with you, the pet owner.

The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) submitted their first draft of the *Prairie Path and Taft Avenue Corridor Plan*. This study is funded by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), and the MacArthur Foundation.

CMAP has worked closely with the Villages of Hillside and Berkeley over the past two years in formulating a blueprint for future development around Taft Avenue and the Prairie Path. This would include the area between Wolf Road on the east, the Tollway on the west, Maple Avenue on the north and Warren Avenue on the south.

The Prairie Path and Taft Avenue Corridor Plan aims to improve and increase biking, hiking and other activities along the Path, attract businesses to the area, and beautify the parks and open space in this designated area.

Throughout the planning process, CMAP conducted more than 150 interviews, held steering committee meetings, did surveys, sought public comments, participated in conversations at community events, and had residents submit ideas through a project website.

The top recommendations submitted by the public for this plan are as follows:

- 1. Better lighting along the Prairie Path
- 2. More native plants and gardens along the Prairie Path
- 3. A coffee shop on Taft Avenue that can serve trail users and residents
- 4. Better sidewalks, nicer signs, awnings, benches, and trees along Taft Avenue
- 5. Better bike connections to the Metra station
- 6. More diverse programming at Berkeley Park and Hillside Commons
- 7. More trees along the Prairie Path

Village of Hillside Offers Free Child Safety Seat Installation

Illinois law requires parents and caregivers to secure children in rear-facing safety seats until they are 2 years old, unless they weigh more than 40 pounds or are more than 40 inches.

The Hillside Fire Department can help you install your child safety seat properly. It is a free service available to Hillside residents. Please call the fire department non-emergency phone number at 708-547-8684 to set up a time to have your child safety seat installed.

Tips to Follow if You Install the Safety Seat

- Never install a rear-facing safety seat in front of an active airbag.
- Follow recline indicator for rear-facing installation.
- Child's head may need at least one inch or more below the top of the safety seat when rear-facing.
- Use the harness straps/slots at or below shoulder level when rear-facing.
- Harness straps must be snug on the child; the harness clip should be at armpit level.
- When a child outgrows a rear-facing safety seat, he or she may transition to a forward-facing seat with a harness system.

Hillside Police Warn... A Car Running Unattended Can Lead to Your Car Being Stolen

Hillside Police are seeing an increase in car thefts. They say the chance of your car getting stolen increases during cold weather. Don't leave your car while it's running. The Police want to inform residents that while it is convenient to let your car stay warm in cold weather — it is easy for thieves to steal.

What You Can Do to Protect Your Vehicle

- 1. Keep your vehicle always locked, even while driving.
- 2. When parked, never leave your keys in the car. Close all the windows and the sunroof.
- 3. Never leave your car running and unattended.
- 4. Avoid leaving valuables inside your vehicle where a passersby can see them.
- 5. Do not leave your vehicle title in the car.
- 6. Hide your vehicle registration in a secure place in the car. Too often a car thief is pulled over and gets away from the police because he or she can produce the auto registration.
- 7. Install an anti-theft system in your vehicle if it doesn't have one. Thieves are reluctant to steal vehicles if they know the cars can be recovered quickly.
- 8. Thieves prefer to work in the dark. Be particularly cautious at night about where you park your car. Park it in a well-lit area if possible.
- 9. Look around. Be aware of your surroundings, especially in garages, parking lots and gas stations. 10. If confronted by a carjacker, do not resist. Cars can be replaced; you can't.

Who You're Dealing With!!

- Professional car thieves commit the majority of auto thefts
- They prefer high-performance cars, as well as less exotic, more popular models whose parts are interchangeable
- These thieves usually turn the cars they steal over to "chop shops," which dismantle them and sell the parts
- They also steal cars for export to other countries, often "stealing to order" to fulfill requests for certain types of vehicles

Carjackers may bump your car from the rear, then steal it when you get out to look for damage. When stopped at a traffic light, leave room to maneuver around the vehicle ahead if you need a quick escape route. If another car bumps yours and you feel threatened, drive to a populated area or, if you have a cellular phone, call the police for assistance.

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Final Thoughts from Mayor Joseph T. Tamburino

Dear Neighbors,

Winter hit us pretty hard this past January and February and for that reason I want to take a moment to thank our Village of Hillside Public Works Department for their round-the-clock efforts in keeping our residential streets clear... we have by far the best snow removal crew in the area.

No matter what the weather, I am excited to report it did not keep 86% of our Hillside residents from getting at least one dose of the Covid 19 vaccine. My question is why are some people hesitant to be vaccinated? The pandemic has taken the lives of 900,000 Americans, which is roughly 300,000 more deaths than those who died from cancer in 2021 as estimated by the American Cancer Society and approximately 240,000 more people than died from heart disease last year as reported by the Center for Disease Control.

It has been over a year since the vaccinations were made available to the public, and they have proven to be safe and very effective. The Village, along with local school districts, area leaders, and pharmacies have hosted several local vaccination clinics, so convenience is not an excuse for being unvaccinated. The Center for Disease Control reported unvaccinated adults had a 68 times greater chance of dying from the Omicron variant than fully vaccinated adults. Do your community, your family, and most of all, do yourself a favor and get vaccinated today!

Our 2022 calendar of events can be viewed on page 3 of this newspaper issue. I can safely say very few villages host as many community happenings as here in Hillside. I believe engaging residents in events like our summer concert series, the Easter and Halloween festivities, and other Village activities instills a sense of community spirit. This spirit will develop a sense of pride in its residents to keep their community safe and clean. These events also bring together Hillside's diverse population, which helps break down the barriers that can exist between people.

Over the past two years, the pandemic has made people feel the need to create more meaningful connections and offer support to others with whom they can build and strengthen relationships. Our Village events fortify those bonds and give residents a sense of belonging to something bigger.

I am excited about the fact that in the next few years the Village Hall renovation project (funded with a grant from the State of Illinois) will include a youth gym, a multi-purpose room, and a banquet facility. These additions will help enhance and expand our community event offerings and provide even more opportunities for residents to get together.
